SUBJECT: Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer Program (P-EBT)
Approval of Connecticut's State Plan for School Children

The Families First Coronavirus Response Act (P.L. 116-127; the Act) as amended by the Continuing Appropriations Act, 2021 and Other Extensions Act (P.L. 116-159) and the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260) authorized the continuation of a temporary assistance program for households with children affected by school closures during the public health emergency that was declared on January 27, 2020. Pursuant to the authority granted under Section 1101 of the Act, FNS approves Connecticut's enclosed plan to operate P-EBT for school children.

Summary of State's Plan

The Connecticut Department of Social Services and the Connecticut State Department of Education will issue P-EBT benefits through the State's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) EBT card system to current SNAP households and non-SNAP households with eligible children. The State's plan covers the months of September, 2020 through June, 2021.

Children are eligible if they would have received free or reduced price meals at their schools through the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) if not for the closure or reduced attendance or hours of their schools for a period of at least 5 consecutive days. The State will use the best feasibly available data and USDA-approved simplifying assumptions to issue benefits in amounts that are tied as closely as possible to the number of days that eligible children do not receive a meal service at school.

The State and its school districts will identify children eligible for free or reduced price NSLP meals using the most current available data. All school districts that rely on SY 2019-2020 eligibility data will have a means to address that they do not issue benefits to last year's graduates and non-students, and will offer households with new students the ability to establish their eligibility through the traditional school food authority-run school meal application and direct certification processes.

In addition, Connecticut will:

- issue benefits for September through January in a single distribution after plan approval,
- issue benefits for the rest of the school year in a single distribution in June,

- use student-level data gathered across four collections and maintained in Connecticut State Department of Education’s student information system to determine student’s free or reduced price eligibility,
- calculate benefits for each student based on the number of days children are enrolled in a fully virtual learning model. Connecticut will use this data to group students into fully virtual, mostly virtual, and hybrid learning mode categories,
- set a constant monthly benefit of 18 days for children enrolled in a fully virtual learning model by averaging the number of instructional days by the number of months in the school year,
- set a “mostly remote” benefit of 13 days for children who are enrolled in a fully remote learning model for at least half of the month; the state reviewed October attendance data to determine that 13 virtual days was the average for children in this category,
- set a “hybrid” benefit of 5 days for hybrid children enrolled in a fully remote learning model for less than half of the month; the state reviewed October attendance data to determine that 5 virtual days was the average for children in this category,
- use attendance data to set or adjust average benefits for each remaining two-month period in the school year for children with mostly remote and hybrid schedules; if justified by the data, the state will set a statewide average benefits for these children,
- collect student enrollment and attendance information from public and private schools no less frequently than monthly in order to calculate student benefits.

Finally, the State will identify risks for improper payments and ensure a high level of integrity.

Estimated Caseload and Value of P-EBT Benefits

The State will calculate monthly benefits for each eligible child in the household equal to the daily reimbursement for a free breakfast, lunch, and snack multiplied by the number of benefit days calculated as described in the State’s plan.

Connecticut estimates that it will issue \$220.0 million to approximately 244,000 children for school closures and reductions in attendance and hours extending from September, 2020 through June, 2021.

Release of Information

Pursuant to Section 1101(e) of the Act, the Secretary hereby authorizes the release of the information necessary to carry out P-EBT in Connecticut. Section 1101(e) of the Act states, “Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Secretary of Agriculture may authorize State educational agencies and school food authorities administering a school lunch program under the Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act (42

U.S.C. 1751 et seq.) to release to appropriate officials administering the supplemental nutrition assistance program such information as may be necessary to carry out this section.”

Plan Timetable and Revisions

Connecticut will distribute benefits to households consistent with the timeframes identified in the State plan. Should the State encounter challenges or delays that significantly impair its ability to implement the approved P-EBT plan or require substantive changes, the State must notify the FNS Regional Office as soon as possible. The FNS Regional Office will work with the State to identify reasonable solutions and review revised plans for approval or further revision.

Civil Rights

Connecticut will continue to comply with civil rights requirements, to include providing equal access to individuals with disabilities and individuals who are limited English proficient.

Administrative Funds

The Connecticut Department of Social Services will participate in a P-EBT Administrative Budget Planning process using the FNS-366(a) Program and Budget Summary. When the FNS-366(a) is finalized, that will determine the State’s Administrative Grant level. However, the FNS-366(a), Program and Budget Summary, may be updated and revised as the State’s operational plan evolves.

Reporting

The Connecticut Department of Social Services will complete the FNS-292B, the FNS-46, the FNS-388, and the FNS-778 reports in accordance with existing requirements.
